

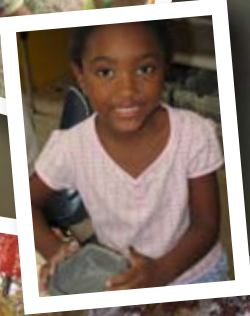
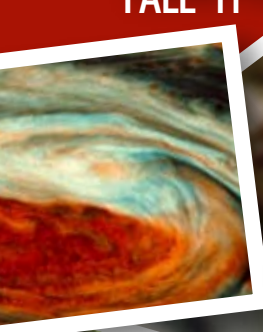

THURSDAY, SEPTEMBER 1, 6 - 8 PM

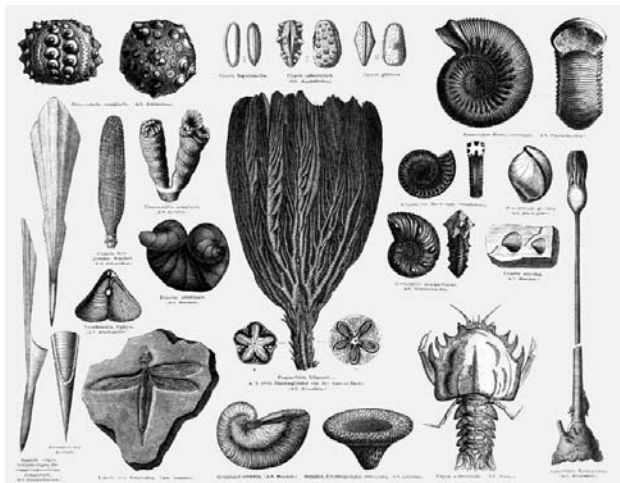

How do we find new therapies from plant chemicals today? The Curator of the University of Kentucky Herbarium, Rob Paratley, will present an overview of the history and importance of medicinal plants. View specimens from the herbarium collection—the oldest and largest collection of preserved plants in Kentucky. Make a mini-plant press to take home and preserve specimens for instruction and art and identify local plants! Learn to make your own key for plants in your neighborhood!

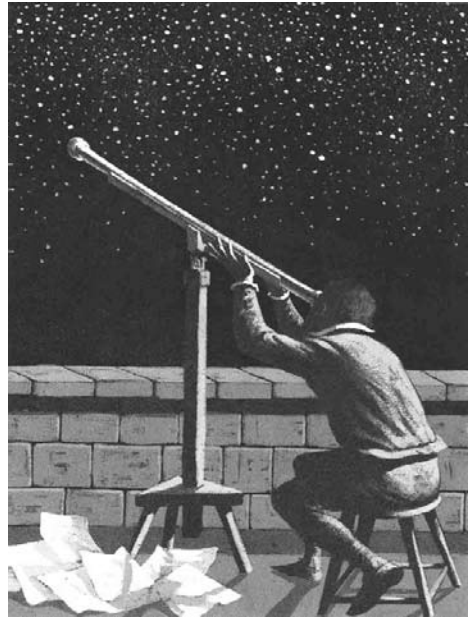

In Isaac Powell's art, the organic imagery of plants and landforms float on top of backgrounds of saturated colors and multicolored squares. Botanical cuttings are transplanted into new environments and there is a playful experimentation with the balance between order and chaos, and growth and decay. Some of Powell's paintings are interactive with panels that slide or open.

Through his paintings, Powell interweaves the themes of life, growth, and reproduction with those of his own personal history. Having been born without a right hand, the flora in his work directly references the body, its appendages and digits. By addressing his own anxieties through the imagery of plant cuttings and grafts, he has developed his own method for confronting both awkwardness and beauty.

Powell is a graduate of the MFA program at Washington State University and now teaches at Eastern Kentucky University. Recently his work has been on display at The Armory Show 2011 in New York City, and at the Smithsonian Institution's International Gallery in Washington, DC.

Colorful, Fantastical, Creature Creations

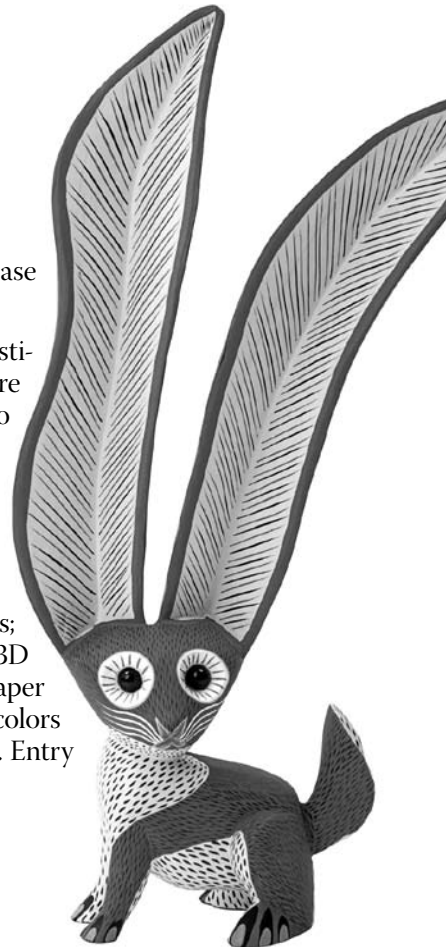

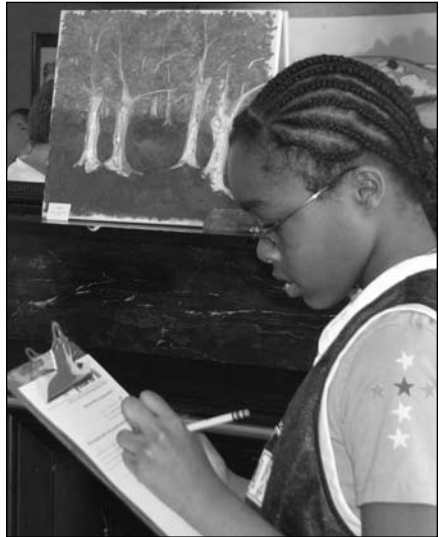

Registration and Cancellation Policies

1. You may now register online at www.LASCLEX.org! Or, you may also register by phone, fax, or mail. To do so, you may use the registration form found on our website or in our printed *Imagine That!*
2. Payment online is by credit card only. Your card will be charged immediately upon your on-line registration. We can no longer hold space with a credit card awaiting check or cash.
3. You may pay by check or credit card via mailed in registrations, or pay by credit card for fax or phoned-in registrations. We can no longer hold space with a credit card awaiting check or cash payment.
4. A \$5 fee will be charged for each transaction (registration) and is non-refundable.
5. Your registration is guaranteed when the LASC receives payment via MasterCard, Visa, Discover, or by check or cash.
6. Upon registration, parents will be sent a confirmation and an emergency contact form that must be completed and returned prior to your class.
7. The member price is the discounted price for LASC members. You may join or renew your membership online at www.LASCLEX.org, include it on your printed registration form, or call the LASC. Be sure to check your membership status to receive your discount.
8. To receive a full refund (excluding \$5 transaction fee), cancellations must be made at least seven days before the first day of the class. No refunds will be given after this deadline.
9. To receive a class credit, cancellations must be made prior to 4 pm on the Thursday before the start of the class.
10. To remain at the LASC between noon and 1 pm during No School Day classes, students must be enrolled in the supervised lunch program and must bring a sack lunch.

12. The LASC reserves the right to cancel any class that does not meet minimum enrollment.

LASC Class Attendance Policies

1. On the first day of class, parents/caretakers must go into the classroom of the LASC with your child and check-in with the teacher.
2. Parents/caretakers may not remain in the classrooms or in the upstairs hall during the child's class. Parents are welcome to wait downstairs in the library or lobby area.
3. Each student must have an updated Emergency Contact Form on file at the LASC.
4. Students should not arrive more than 15 minutes before the start of class.
5. Three-hour classes have a break-time. Send a snack/drink for this time.
6. Parents or caretakers must come to their child's classroom at dismissal time and teachers must see the person picking up each child. Please let teachers know if your child is to be picked up by someone other than yourself.
7. To avoid injury on stairs and outdoors, students must wear sturdy, closed-toe shoes (No flip-flops or sandals).
8. Art can be messy! Children should also wear comfortable, older clothes.
9. Students may not attend class with electronic games, cell phones or personal toys unless specifically requested by the teacher.
